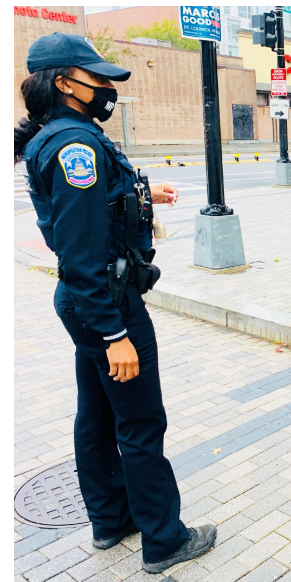

Top Five Things You Can Do To Protect Yourself Today

With law enforcement officer Covid-19 deaths increasing across the country, the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial and Museum and our Destination Zero medical experts offer these simple and effective tips that may help to reduce your officers' risk of exposure. Make sure your officers are taking these top 5 pandemic precautions.

1. Wear your mask and gloves.
2. Sanitize your vehicle at the beginning and end of each shift
3. Sanitize your leather gear and exterior ballistic vest at the end of each shift
4. Change out of your uniform before entering your home
5. Avoid nonessential contact with the public
